Hello there, Mom and Dad, how are you doin'? I'm in a USO Club in Fayetteville, NC. I just talked to you on the phone, and it sure was great to hear your voices again. I'm plenty busy here, and they keep us going every minute. We fired the 105 howitzers last week, and it sure was a thrill. . . . Just a second here, I got my pages crossed up here . . . I walked guard duty yesterday. Our gang had it for 24 hrs. You walk for two hours and are off for four. That makes 8 hours walking in all, and it sure gets tiresome. Went over to the commando course, and boy what a mess. They throw live dynamite at you most of the way, and it sort of keeps you moving, if you know what I mean.

There's a long stretch of swamp of it that has mud up to your waist, first, and then I had to travel over all obstacles conceivable. There was a stretch of about 20 ft. of barbed wire on the ground. You had to crawl under it. Someone must have stood up nights thinking of all these things. It really wasn't too bad, though, except for the mud. It sure does tire you too. [inaudible] My trip to West Virginia last week was really wonderful. Mrs. Vaughn had steaks for us as big as I've ever seen, hot and sizzling. I can see the water dripping from the fellows's mouths here all around me, so I'd better stop this kind of talk. Oh yah, just one thing more. We had southern style fried chicken for Sunday dinner. It was really great.
